






Strategic Instrument Choices

Twenty-four prominent instruments shaped the sound and vibe of Taylor Swift Hot 100 top 10 hits.


Every song features drums/percussion, with electronic drums slightly edging out acoustic drums. Non-bass synth, synth bass, and electric guitar are present in over half of all songs.

As Swift's music started to shift from country to overt pop and beyond, her instrument choices followed suit.

Instruments: 2008 - 2023




From Country Instrumentation to Pop Synths Country-leaning instrumentation such as mandolin, fiddle and banjo are highly prevalent in Swift's early body of work. 
From Electric Bass to Synth Bass

Electric bass is a staple of Swift's early work, present in all of her top 10s from Fearless through Red. Red also introduced synth bass into the mix, which coincided with her shift into more overt pop territory. From 1989 on, synth bass provided foundation in nearly all of her top 10s, while electric bass faded to nil.




From Acoustic to Electronic Drums


Also a staple of Swift's early body of work are acoustic drums, which define the beat on Fearless and Speak Now. However, their use faded from Red through Reputation, while electronic drums emerged to fit her pop-centric approach. From then on it was a mixed bag, with acoustic, electronic, and acoustic/electronic combo drums being present in an assortment of her top 10s.



The Shift Away From Guitars Guitars - both electric and acoustic - are a defining element in Swift's early sound. After Red, their use started to diminish (acoustic more notably than electric), with the main exception being songs on the singer-songwriter and folk-leaning folklore and evermore. Acoustic & Electronic Sounds The majority of hits throughout Swift's career feature a combination of acoustic and electronic sounds. The most overt electronic-leaning songs can be heard on 1989, Reputation, and Midnights, while acoustic-leaning hits are few and far between. 




Major Use of Major Keys


The vast majority of Taylor Swift's top 10 body of work are in a major key. The minor exceptions - 2017's "Ready For It" and "Look What You Made Me Do" - have their minor tonalities complimenting their edgy vibes while putting them in-tune with Hot 100 top 10 trends. In 2017, the majority of pop songs were in a minor key, due in part to hip hop/rap's influence on them - a genre that favors minor tonalities. Both songs possess a hip hop/rap influence.

Evolution by Album: Major vs. Minor



Strategically Chosen Tempos The average tempo of Taylor Swift's Hot 100 top 10 body of work ranges from 74 BPM (folklore/evermore) to 111 BPM (Red). Each song's tempo is strategically chosen to compliment their intended vibe, from the empowering "Shake It Off" (160 BPM) to the melancholic "Maroon" (54 BPM).
